WINNER OF SIX DROMEDARY AWARDS



HERSCHEL K. McINTOSH December 24, 1916 - July 21, 2011 Potentate 1967

No. 4072 Noble Herschel Kenneth McIntosh of Houlton was born Dec. 24, 1916, in Littleton, the son of Kenneth and Viola (Porter) McIntosh and died on July 21, 2011 at a local health care facility.

He graduated valedictorian of Houlton High School, class of 1933, and graduated from Maine School of Commerce, class of 1937. He served in the U.S. Army during World War II. He was a member of Houlton United Methodist Church, where he served as treasurer and financial secretary for 20 years. He also served on the board of trustees and many other committees. He was employed by George Pennington for eight years and was co-owner and accountant for L.E. MacNair Co. for 33 years.

He served on the advisory board for the Salvation Army, was an 81-year member of Houlton Grange. He was a member of Houlton Rotary Club, and received the Paul Harris Fellow Award, and a member of the Houlton Chamber of Commerce. where he served as treasurer for several years. He was a member of the National

Association of Accountants. He enjoyed traveling with his wife and visited many of the U.S. States, as well as many foreign countries. He climbed Mount Katahdin in 1986 at age 70. Family and fraternal organizations were a very important part of his life, but his greatest joy was living at the cottage at Nickerson Lake.

His Masonic affiliations included membership in Monument Lodge No. 96, AF & AM, and was Past Master, Past Senior Grand Warden. Past Grand Marshall and Past Assistant Grand Lecturer of Grand Lodge of Maine. He was a member of Scottish Rite, Board of Governors for 32° Learning Center, a 33rd degree member of the Supreme Council and The York Rite Bodies. He was the oldest living past potentate of Anah Shriners and was past director of Bangor Court No. 150 Royal Order of Jesters and a member of Aroostook County Shrine Club. He was past patron of Fidelity Chapter No. 32 and member of Lunar Chapter No. 126, Order of the Eastern Star. His enrollment in Anah Shriners was recorded as August 11, 1950.



CAROL HERSOM **Retires from Anah Office** A well-known figure at the Anah Recorder's Office has retired after nearly 23 years of service and will be greatly missed

by all the Nobles and Ladies coming in to deal with the Recorder's Office in person or looking for help on the phone. Her well-earned retirement began on August 12 after a long period of deliberation.

Carol came to the Anah office from an office in Belfast where she had worked as a computer data entry person for a number of years. In the Anah Office Carol was known for keeping the records up to date and accurate as the computer person, she actually took on the job at about the same time the office became computerized. She was almost immediately sent to Imperial Headquarters in Tampa for a course in how to handle the complexities of the computer system. The computer training was one week long, where for eight hours a day she had hands on instruction and training and during the evenings she had to review the day's work to prepare for the next day. When asked how the training course was, "she said intense". She did much more than operating the computer, (her actual title was Administrative Assistant) handling many of the details pertinent to the operation of Anah. Carol has not said what she intends to do during her retirement but it is expected that husband, Noble Myron Hersom and her four children and 21 grandchildren will keep her entertained. In addition to being involved in family activities she enjoys cooking, knitting and oil painting.

Carol has said: "I feel very fortunate to have been involved in the Anah Shrine office for nearly 23 years and have especially enjoyed meeting all the wonderful people along the way and will keep them in my heart and memory forever." She would like to thank all the Past Potentates and their Ladies and the many people that have helped her over the years. She says there would be too many to list, she loves them all and will miss them all.





interesting information about Shriners Hospital compiled by the National Burn Registry. There were 210 acute first-time admissions in 2010. Males have typically outnumbered females with 60% males and 40% females. Whites continue to represent the greatest number of admissions with Hispanics 25%, Blacks 18%, and Asians at 7%. With respect to age over half of our acute admissions (61%) were under the age of 5, 24% were 5 to 13 and 15% were greater than 13 years old. The majority of patients in 2010 (52%) were from Massachusetts, 24% from the other New England States, 7% were outside New England and 17% were outside the continental U.S.

The burn injuries were (52%) scald/ burn injuries, (26%) were the result of fire/ flame injuries, and (15%) were due to contact with a hot object. Electrical burns were 6% and chemical burns were 1%.

One hundred six scald injuries were reported in 2010. The majority of the scalds were due to hot/foods or liquids related to cooking, (43%) hot boiling water such as coffee/tea spills and (19%) hot tap water. There were 53 registry patients with injury due to fire/flame, 21% were from highly flammable material, 42% from ignition of clothing, 25% from conflagration (house fire), 4% due to fireworks/gunpowder, 6% from explosion of gases and 2% for unspecified fires. For the 126 patients under

age 5 the most common was scald burns affecting 67% of the patients, contact 18%, fire/flame 11%, electrical 2% and chemical 2%. The forty-eight patients in the 5-13 age category the most common injury was fire/flame burns in 48%, followed by scalds in 33%, contact in 11% and electrical in 8%. The thirty-one patients greater than 13 years old were 52% fire/flame, scalds 16%, electrical 16%, contact 13% and chemical burns 3%.



Spinal Cord Injury Program Leaders



Children and adolescents who sustain a spinal cord injury (SCI) need more than medical care. Again, it was a great Ceremonial in Belfast. Kudos to everyone who participated. Nice work.



I hope everyone has had a great summer. One thing I did this summer was a large research project for a week-long workshop on early American history which I attended in July at the Henry Knox Museum in Thomaston as part of their Summer Teachers Institute program. My project was on the Battle of Hampden and the Plundering of Bangor in September of 1814 during the War of 1812. Eastern Maine and the Penobscot River region played a very important role in the both the Revolution and the War of 1812. Yes, there were some shots fired in anger in our area. Yes, there were some lost lives, some people wounded, and some taken prisoner, though, fortunately, relatively few. Yes, there are two British soldiers buried in Hampden as a result of the Battle of Hampden. Yes, ships were burned and sunk, and towns were occupied and pillaged. Eastern Maine from the coast to the Penobscot was a British target given its proximity to its Canadian territory and given their desire to control our coastal trade, ship-building, and wood resources. Very interesting times! With this research I have created an academic unit which I will incorporate in my Maine Studies classes. It has been great fun visiting the local libraries and historical societies in the area. These kinds of projects are great quests, and it is fun to discover unexpected things, such as the copy of a letter I located in an old publication from one of the British officers involved in the Battle of Hampden written to his commander in which he assesses the performance of the Maine Militia commander, Brigadier General John Blake of Brewer. Did you know that Joshua Chamberlain's grandfather, also named Joshua Chamberlain, was a major in the militia at this time and was at the Battle of Hampden? Did you know General Blake, Chamberlain, and Hampden officer Andrew Grant were court martialed in Bangor in 1815 and 1816 for dereliction of duty given their loss at the Battle of Hampden? (Blake and Chamberlain were acquitted. Grant was convicted of some it and was suspended from the militia for two years.) Fascinating. We have a very rich and interesting history in Maine. So much to explore across so many topics. Wikipedia has a decent write-up on the Battle of Hampden if you want to learn more.

Looks like Noble Allen Sawyer's new house has arrived in Trenton. I hope he doesn't think just because he's moving to Trenton that he's going to star in my col-




Andy Constantine drew the 50/50 and PP John Fernald collected the winnings for Julian White.



87th Imperial in Miami

The August 1961 Anahgram reported that the Imperial Council Session was held in Miami, Florida with 80,000 Nobles in attendance.

The session was held from June 18-22 and was described by many as the greatest display of Shrine pageantry in the history of the order. Advance units were arriving early to prepare the way and by the time the session had started thousands of Nobles were coming into Miami by

train, plane, car and bus. For many it meant serious business but for others a Roman Holiday was being expected by enjoying their fun with Nobles from all over the United States.

While many of the Nobles were having fun, one group was hard at work, The Recorders held their Annual Meeting at the DuPont Hotel taking care of the business at hand.

The Royal Order of Jesters held a day long open house in a professional building.

Tuesday, June 20 was the day of the big parade and thousands watched from every available spot along the parade route. The parade ended at the Orange Bowl where many people waited to welcome them
